FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Honouring the past, shaping the future

Gathering as a school this year, out by the wetlands for our Foundation Day Assembly, I found myself looking at the sea of over 700 students and feeling a sense of celebration for the changes we are making at Cornish College that challenge some of the out-dated norms in schooling and education. At the same time, I was sharing a message with our community about honouring and celebrating the past and respecting our foundations – for that is what Foundation Day is about.

It may be seen as a dichotomy – to celebrate both change and foundation. It could be considered that if we truly honour foundation, history or tradition, that change would not be necessary. It is true that some institutions see change as somewhat disrespectful to their foundations. At Cornish College, though, our very foundations are built on the courage for change that gives us the drive for contemporary practice.

Education for a sustainable future, necessitates change. In order to keep our world in balance we must always be forward-thinking, challenging the status-quo and making changes that will counterbalance one area of sustainability with another. This is very much what seeing the world through the lens of our Rings of Sustainability is about. When we see change as a result of urban-technological advances, for example, we look for ways to adjust our personal, socio-cultural and natural sustainability to find equilibrium. Thus, if change in our world is a constant, which it clearly is, then change in our schooling and education must also be continual. What is important at Cornish College, is that we find the space between the new and the old to connect change to our foundational principles.

The changes we celebrate at Cornish College today – whether they be to uniform, curriculum, our biodiverse land or to our infrastructure – are all made with reference to that space between the new and the old. In ecology we might refer to this space as the 'ecotone' – the transitional area between two compatible systems. It can be a place for productive tension and the generation of unique and thriving species. When the changes we make are based on the foundations of education for a sustainable future and our motto, 'make a difference, be the difference' then we know we are creating habitable conditions in which our entire learning community can thrive.





To honour our past and prepare our young people for the future, we must continue to operate in this space where change and foundation are seen, not as dichotomous, but as connected drivers for education of a different kind. It is indeed an exciting time to lead a community through an 'ecotone' that brings currency to education and fulfilment to the schooling experience for our students. That's the Cornish College difference.

A paper presentation on the world stage

Cornish College is very proud of Gemma Wildermuth (CC2022) who recently visited Paris to deliver a paper presentation at the 72nd International Astronautical Congress, held by the International Astronautical Federation.

In short, Gemma was approached by one of her robotics team mentors who asked if she would like to contribute to a paper he was writing for a conference around engaging senior school girls in STEM subjects. Gemma respectfully disagreed with her mentor's theory, arguing that, in her experience, high school is too late a time to garner such interest. She theorised that girls can be shown that STEM is not as daunting as it might seem by way of combining a multifaceted approach whereby senior school role models work with middle-to-upper primary students within short, fun, and engaging activities. In measuring confidence levels between boys and girls, she found the latter to be less confident yet very much capable of STEM electives.

These conversations evolved into Gemma not only contributing to her mentor's paper but actually assembling her own paper, finding that the idea and theory would make for a compelling submission in its own right. It transpires that Gemma's abstract was accepted to form the basis of a public presentation at the organisation's forthcoming conference in Paris, attended largely by university lecturers and heads of big corporations.

Gemma was most pleased with the overall response to her 15-minute presentation, noting that the room was full and attendees were clearly engaged with what she had to say. While it was perhaps a little intimidating to speak at an event not ordinarily intended for high school students, any anxieties were quickly replaced with a feeling of excitement for the fact that this body of work was finally going to be shared with others. Judging by the note-taking and carefully crafted questions from the room, delegates were genuinely interested in this presentation.

Gemma believes that there is potential for her paper to be developed beyond its current scope, with some of her ideas therein to be problematised on a much larger scale. Since Paris, her mentor has, in fact, shared this work with a couple of individuals in the field who would be motivated to see it developed further. Going forward, Gemma is considering studying a double degree in Engineering and Architecture whilst continuing to work with her robotics team. She hopes that there will be ample opportunity to share with other young students the great insights and knowledge acquired through this invaluable, international experience.

She is grateful that the focus on student-agency at Cornish gave her the opportunity to work with Year 5 students to confirm her theories about STEM.

2022 VCE Results

The College was thrilled when the Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE) results were announced at the close of 2022. Our students have, once again, risen to the challenge, having embraced this year with dedication and positivity, to achieve outstanding results.

As the eighth cohort to complete the VCE at Cornish College, the *Class of 2022* represents our community's commitment to continuous improvement with our highest results to date.

Eight Cornish College students (15% of the cohort) achieved ATARs above 90, placing those students among the top 10% of the state.

Our focus on continuous improvement is highlighted this year with over 40% of the cohort achieving an ATAR in the top 20% of the state with an ATAR of 80 or above. Furthermore, in 2022 our mean and median ATAR have risen again to the highest to date, as have our mean study scores for English and Further Mathematics. We are delighted to announce that our 2022 Dux is Eliza Mason with an ATAR of 99.15. Joining Eliza with scores above 90 are Zoe Allison, Charlotte Davies, Vincent Day, Jake Ormsby-Goard, Mathilda Maas, Lara Veldstra, Thomas Vidotto.

The impossible made possible

We are delighted to say that Extend Cornish College has received an Exceeding rating on five of the seven criteria, demonstrating extraordinary care, strong relationships with the family and school community, and inspiring and educational programs.

Karlie has worked at Cornish College for seven years and her love for the children in her care and continued dedication to the families is certainly demonstrated through this accomplishment.

Many in the industry claim that it is 'impossible' to receive such a rating in the OSHC sector, yet Extend at Cornish College has proved that it can indeed be done. We thank Karlie and Nicolene for their ongoing dedication to the service and efforts in achieving this fantastic outcome – we are extremely proud!



Victorian Premiers' Reading Challenge

In 2022 the College achieved several great results from its tenth year of participating in the Victorian Premiers' Reading Challenge.

The Reading Challenge, open to students from Prep to Year 7, saw 180 registrations with 72 students successfully reading the required number of books. Running from the beginning of Term 2 until the close of Term 3, the Reading Challenge, requires students to read a certain number of books during the given period. Some titles are to be selected from a specified list, thereby encouraging participants to read widely and, in the process, explore new authors and genres.

Not only does it equip students with a focus for their reading, but can build a sense of achievement in approaching more challenging material. Importantly, such initiatives contribute to increased literacy levels and allow for parents to become involved in their child's reading development.

We are grateful to Naki Khan who introduced the Reading Challenge, to our Cornish community a decade ago and acknowledge her enormous support in both running the initiative and encouraging student participation for the first six years. In 2023 we plan to open registration to our Early Learning Centre cohort to inspire a love of reading for a wider student demographic and their families.

Presenting Cornish to the wider community

We were delighted in early November to launch our new Cornish College website – an initiative that has been in development for quite some time. Not only does the website exhibit a fresh 'look and feel', but, more importantly, truly captures the essence of Cornish.

Our website stands as the key way in which we present online to the wider community and, in keeping with an approach taken by many other schools, replaces what was traditionally a printed *Prospectus*. We include additional information around new academic aspects of the College and the Executive Leadership Team, as well as the Cornish Shop where you can purchase Cornish-branded items.

We are encouraged by a wealth of feedback received to date, including this message from a member of staff following their conversation with an external school camp provider: 'I contacted a sustainable bushland camp regarding accommodation options. While explaining that they are no longer accepting school groups, they were nevertheless so impressed by our sustainability philosophy and actions from our website that they would be glad to accommodate us'. High praise indeed!

Blue Day

We were overwhelmed by the community response to our annual Cornish College 'Blue Day' Christmas drive. It is wonderful to be able to contribute to the Asylum Seeker Refugee Centre.

Thank you to those who generously donated items including stationery, tinned goods, pantry items, cleaning and hygiene products. On the day, our students and staff enjoyed dressing in blue to promote hope and calmness.



Timor-Leste Colour Celebration

The last day of the school year is marked with the Timor-Leste Colour Celebration. Cornish College has developed a special and important relationship with the Fatuquero School in Timor-Leste, with Cornish students and staff having undertaken service trips there since 2016. Our school is dedicated to making a difference for the lives of the students and teachers of the Fatuquero School through regular fundraising events helping to support this initiative.

As part of the Colour Celebration, our community raised a total of \$2,227.20. These funds will make a significant difference in our commitments for student scholarships in 2023–24: tertiary scholarships at US\$250 each, and eight secondary students at US\$100 each. Two tertiary students completed their studies at the end of 2022; we will commence two new scholarships for Years 8 or 9 students from the beginning of 2023.

Fatuquero student scholarships

Each year, Cornish commits to providing two new educational scholarships for students at the Fatuquero School who exhibit a commitment to their ongoing education, an aptitude for learning English, and that come from a situation of financial hardship. The scholarship continues for their entire educational journey, typically beginning in Year 8 and continuing until the

end of their tertiary studies. Secondary school students receive US\$100 per year, which increases to US\$250 during their tertiary years.

Volunteer teachers

Some adults without employment offer themselves to local schools as volunteers to support the education of young people in their community. In 2018, Cornish began supporting volunteers with a modest living allowance of US\$50 per month to encourage their commitment and acknowledge the significance of their contribution – such support has continued to date.

Cornish is proud to currently be supporting twelve students on scholarships. We are also supporting one of the volunteers as they study to become a qualified English teacher.

Timor IMPACCT experience

Twelve students from Cornish College will participate in the upcoming 2023 Timor IMPACCT (Immersion, Mission, Partnership, Action, Challenge, Culture, Teaching) Experience.

A reflection of who we are and how we learn



In 2021 we launched our new branding which represents the forward thinking, caring and innovative school that we have always been and will continue to strive to be: we are explorers with the commitment and courage to redefine schooling for a sustainable future.

As a natural extension of that process, we were proud to launch our new Cornish College uniform in November which draws on the work of many people from our community over the past 18 months. There will be a transition period in 2023 and 2024 where both new and old uniforms can be worn, but from 2025 all our students will wear the new uniform.

With a proud reputation for innovation and strong belief in the capability of all students, we seek to honour student agency in every aspect of their schooling. Our new 'uniform wardrobe' recognises that our young people can make informed and independent choices about what to wear to school each day.

Whilst they can choose their own combination of clothing, the wardrobe builds on the strong sense of belonging that we nurture, and offers a range of items that proudly identify students as part of our community.

The wardrobe includes some elements of tradition and formality for students who feel that is what suits them best, together with a range of casual and activewear choices to meet other preferences.

There are no gender-specific requirements and students can choose from either tailored or relaxed fittings for some items.

The range is cross-seasonal, meaning that items are no longer linked to particular times of the year and each item can be worn all year-around.

In keeping with the College's values and underpinning ethos, we have utilised sustainable fabrics in key garments such as the polo shirt, shorts and trousers. We acknowledge that this needs to be 'in balance' with affordability, wearability and durability.

At the beginning of 2023 we were delighted to see so many students proudly wearing the new uniform.

Focus on sustainability

Our students have continued to contribute to several key initiatives which not only seek to raise awareness about sustainable practices, but put these ideas into action.

Sustainability Action Team

Teams of students have been working hard around the school on sustainability initiatives as part of their PYP units of inquiry. During Term 4, the Year 3s focused on sustainable action, forming groups which probed several areas of sustainable thought across the College, such as, reducing litter around the grounds, strengthening our waste collection strategies, and exploring sustainable transport options.

Sustainability Think Tank

In 2022, a team of College staff formed the 'Sustainability Think Tank' – a space where ideas around sustainable practices and the ethos of 'make a difference' can be shared and discussed. To date, a wealth of ideas have been brainstormed with two such initiatives entering the progress stage.

Special mention goes to staff member and head of our golf program Sean Kirschenberg, who was motivated to launch a 'walking bus' project by utilising a parking area close to the school. Year 2 classroom teacher, Kylie Yeomans, meanwhile, has launched 'Roving Refills' to coincide with National Recycling Week. The small business 'Roving Refills' in Frankston adopts a 'zero waste' mindset in its selling of eco-friendly cleaning products – and certainly aligns with our long-term sustainable vision for the College and connections with the local community.

Gumboot Recycling and Exchange Program

It is fairly common in the primary years that students will outgrow their gumboots before they outwear them, potentially leading to perfectly good items going to waste. We have, therefore, started a gumboot exchange and recycling program. When people have outgrown their gumboots, they can either donate or exchange them for a larger pair, thereby encouraging reuse and preventing perfectly good boots from entering landfill. It is a 'win-win' situation and something we will continue in 2023.

We look forward to building upon our existing sustainability initiatives in 2023, such as the '123Read2Me' and 'Breadtags for Wheelchairs' programs. Our engagement with programs offered by Sustainability Victoria, as well as wider-reaching initiatives like that of 'Earth Hour' and 'Clean Up Australia Day', certainly complement a quest to promote a sustainable mindset and change habits for the better within our creative, forward-thinking environment.

Our solar investment

As Cornish College moves into its next decade, Echo Group Australia has been enlisted to review our current solar investment and consider potential strategies and storage solutions. We are delighted to be able to share with you some further details around this initiative: At present, 33% of the energy used to power our property derives from solar, offsetting over 90,000 kilograms of CO2 and totaling savings in the thousands of dollars. With forthcoming increases to the wholesale cost of energy, adding additional solar capacity and storage seems a logical step forward. Over the coming years, there is scope to move towards 100% solar offset with an additional 150 kilowatts of solar capacity, plus a subsidy in the form of the Victorian Energy Efficiency Certificate. In due course, all solar power will be produced on the property and weekend consumption exported back to the grid. We often hear



in the national conversation that solar is one of several renewable energy sources that will power Australia's future; this review process certainly allows Cornish to consider its own sustainable future and to start moving more decisively in that direction.

From the Archives

Perhaps a 'silver lining' emerging from widespread disruption and upheaval over the past few years is that Josette Mulcahy (CC2016) and I have found time to contribute to the development of the Cornish College Archive. In the absence of usual work assignments, educational placements, and day-to-day happenings, we could shift our attention to putting in place the core infrastructure for a workable and user-friendly archival resource for the years ahead.

I am pleased to advise at this point of time that we have ordered the collection chronologically and assembled sets of documents, such as, yearbooks and annual publications according to a logical, numerical catalogue. Through this process, we have uncovered both internal and published documents which help to tell the story of Cornish across the decades. Iconographic evidence, in the form of Mike Davis' treasure trove of photos, examples of student work, and video commentary which speaks to our ongoing connection with this expansive property, likewise, document the past and present with an almost 'three-dimensional' quality.

The task of item digitisation is a substantial one indeed – and one that will, no doubt, demand the attention of College archivists over the coming decade. Like the National Archives of Australia, we are up against the clock when it comes to digitising older forms of multimedia at risk of becoming unreadable. A twenty-first

century archival resource ought to be both accessible in hard copy and the digital space to keep pace with emerging technologies, thereby minimising the chance of losing material whilst increasing means of accessibility.

In 2022, we trialled collating sets of yearbooks and decade-specific photos for display at College alumni functions, finding this type of exhibit to be very popular with attendees for its strong nostalgic factor. So too is the concept of a 'virtual' school tour for those alumni attending our off-campus events. Initiatives of this sort are certainly true to our overarching aim to make archival content readily accessible to the wider school community.

Any archival resource, far from existing as a mere set of dusty shelves and seldom-opened boxes, might, rather, be perceived as a 'living document' which evolves over time in response to continuities and changes. To that end, the Cornish College Archive will certainly continue to grow in size over the coming decades as each consecutive year brings with it new stories and the rediscovery of artefacts from decades past. There is ample work ahead, for example, digitising photo collections, cataloguing existing documents, and establishing ties with local historical societies; however, such contributions will be built upon a strong archival framework and culture of giving back to the community.

While this was certainly a big change for me, I have never forgotten that Cornish has instilled in me the importance of finding a way to use one's skills to make the world a better place. Upon first reading Paper Giant's Mission Statement – to help organisations deliver better services and policy for a more equal and just society – I knew that I had discovered the right place for my next career step. I am fortunate to have the flexibility one day a week for personal and freelance projects, such as, volunteering as a graphic designer for animal sanctuary Edgar's Mission and proudly sitting on the Cornish Collegians Management Committee.

If I were to offer one piece of advice to senior school students, it would be to take things step-by-step, because you have plenty of time! If you stay true to understanding what matters to you as an individual, and are prepared to put your best effort in, good things are sure to follow.

A love of learning



Dr Shreya Rana (CC2010) attended the Cornish Campus of St Leonard's College from 2005 to 2008 before completing her VCE studies at the Brighton Campus in 2010. Since then, she has enjoyed a wealth of scholarly and early career opportunities within the discipline of medicine, reflecting upon the impact 'The Cornish Experience' has had on her motivations and interests to date:

I am currently a junior doctor in the third year of my early career, working across Monash Medical Centre, Dandenong Hospital, and the Monash Children's Hospital. Following Year 12, I commenced a five-year course at Monash University's Medical School before deciding to take a 'lateral step' and dipping my toes into research. This initial scholarly curiosity culminated in a four-year commitment, resulting in a PhD. Beyond that point, I sought to complete my final year of medical school and move into work as a doctor at Peninsula Health. Medicine is certainly a rewarding career, but

it can prove to be physically and emotionally demanding. And while there is a greater focus on mental health among medical professionals and associated changes to support networks, there is still a long way to go.

I am currently working towards a career in paediatric surgery. That said, medicine is quite unique in that there is adequate scope to 'pivot' and investigate different areas of specialisation in order to find the best fit – so who knows where I might end up. I feel incredibly lucky to have had 'The Cornish Experience' for my secondary schooling. What stands out in my mind is the encouragement and development of lateral thinking, fostering a drive to 'make a difference', and the opportunity to engage in a range of subjects. A particular stand-out for me was the Indigenous Studies class taught by Chris Grummet.

While a maths-minded student, I also harboured a keen interest in music. I thought that such an interest would remain a hobby-level, extracurricular activity, but the performance opportunities at Cornish gave me the encouragement and confidence to continue music at the VCE level. For me, Cornish was truly a formative experience, not simply in schooling, but in developing a sense of self and has significantly shaped the person I am today.
